

The Robert H. Jackson Center of Media personalities from opposite ends of Chautauqua County will be the guests of Jamestown's Novel Destination~Used Book Emporium on Saturday afternoon, September 27.

From 2-4 p.m. Novel Destination will host long-time WJTN program host Jim Roselle and Jamestown Gazette editor Walt Pickut with their book

Jim Roselle: *The Best Times of My Life*, a memoir by Roselle as told to Pickut. Also featured will be *Dunkirk Observer* columnist and Cassadaga novelist Susan Crossett Dilks, the author of *Her Reason for Being*, published in 2008, and the newly released *Love in Three Acts*.

The writers will visit with readers and sign their

books at 177 Fluvanna Avenue, across from Save-A-Lot Food Store in Jamestown.

With a career history of broadcasting for 40 years from Chautauqua Institution and for 60 years on WJTN 1240 AM Jamestown, Jim Roselle has interviewed some of the most famous people in the world. In *The Best Times of My Life*, the New York State Broadcaster's Hall of Fame inductee recalls memorable and historic conversations like the one with a young Arkansas governor named Bill Clinton and legendary songstress Judy Collins. He reveals the real people behind the fame and the celebrity of 40 of his more than 1,800 Chautauqua Institution interviews and hundreds of hometown broadcast conversations culled from the WJTN archives.

Writing under her maiden name, Susan Crossett's weekly column in the *Observer*, "Musings from the Hill," appears every Friday morning.

The Warren, Pa., native's *Love in Three Acts* tells of a devoted cellist and her involvement with a former instructor, following from her grad school days until her late sixties. Music is woven into the intrigues of Libby and the three close friends who make up their college string quartet. *Her Reason for Being* traces two Buffalo women and their lives from 1875 until 1916, a period which encompasses Frank Lloyd Wright and the Pan American Exposition. Her characters manage to take trips to Fredonia, Chautauqua and Warren.

Novel Destination's proprietor Carrie Wolfgang will serve refreshments while visitors meet and speak with the authors. Books will be available for purchase and autographing.



"Becky Newman is a dynamic educator who leads by example and uses her role as a teacher and leader to encourage and motivate students to examine more closely the world around them," said James C. John-

son, President and CEO of the Robert H. Jackson Center. "The selection committee found her to be most worthy of receiving the 2014 Robert H. Jackson Center Regional Award for Teaching Justice."



Jackson was a country lawyer in Jamestown, NY who subsequently served as Solicitor General, Attorney General, and as an Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court. Following World War II, Justice Jackson was appointed Chief U.S. Prosecutor at the International Military Tribunal, Nuremberg, where he personally led the trials against the senior Nazi leadership for crimes against humanity, war crimes and crimes of aggression. His ground breaking work at Nuremberg served as a model for today's International Criminal Tribunals and his writings and actions have come to personify the American ideal of fairness and justice for all.

The Robert H. Jackson Center was established to honor and advance Justice Jackson's remarkable legacy, pursue the relevance of his life's work, and to provide an educational facility for those purposes. ## Reed Teams With Grape Growers to Protect Integrity of Wine Industry

Tom Reed is weighing in on behalf of local grape growers and wineries to protect them from potentially misleading domain names. Hearing from local grape growers, Reed weighed in with the Internet Corporation for Assigning Names and Numbers (ICANN) on local concerns using .wine and .vin domains for individuals or organizations not involved in the production or sale of wine and the possible negative impact that could have. Reed, a member of the Congressional Wine Caucus, meets with district grape growers regularly both in the district and in Washington to hear the latest issues impacting the industry.

"Grape growers and winery

owners came to us with their genuine concerns that giving non-wine related entities use of wine domain names could mislead consumers and even threaten the reputation of the wine industry," Reed said. "We want to make sure we're doing what we can to protect local grape and wine industry products from unfair manipulation from organizations not affiliated with the wine and grape industry."

As ICANN goes through the process of designating global domain names, the organization is considering new .vin and .wine domains to identify different subject matters from the traditional .com domain. The concern local grape growers have is that non-wine related individuals and organizations will purchase these domains and threaten the integrity of legitimate wineries. As a result,

the wine industry could be forced to purchase endless versions of domain names to protect the integrity of their products.

"With more than 140 wineries in the Southern Tier and Finger Lakes, our grape growers and wineries are significant economic drivers for tourism and recreation," Reed continued. "Anything that could negatively affect the wine industry here in our district needs to be weighed carefully so that nothing is done to threaten the vibrancy and potential of the wine industry in New York."

Chautauqua County is New York State's number one grape producing county, with over 15,500 acres of grapes. All together, farmers in the 23rd district produce over 150,000 tons of grapes annually.



# Beyond Mums for the Fall Container Garden

Use nature as a guide to create garden containers that reflect the beauty of fall. Mums are always a first choice, but do consider spicing up your planters by adding other plants still available at the nurseries. Let me make a few suggestions:

Bring a seasonal splash of color to your entryway by mixing and matching eye-popping blooms with rustic grasses and foliage in your fall containers. Try eye-catching Purple Fountain Grass surrounded by Lantana.

Some annuals to use: Violas and Pansies can handle cooler temperatures; Marigolds are great with rich velvet colors; Utilize Sweet potato vines of purple or green, but only while the weather is still warm. Sweet potato vine is very sensitive to cooler temperatures, it won't last into late fall. Ivy is a more lasting, hardy choice; Coleus are found in many color ranges from rust to deep purple.

Sedums add interest. Some dangle, some stand medium to tall. Leaves

vary in colors from green and bronze, to gray-green with small flowers shaped liked stars. Mostly used in the fall flower bed, but they are an excellent choice for the fall container.

'Key Lime Pie'- Heuchera is bright and 'Sparkling Burgundy' Heuchera - a burgundy red will bring compliments; Heucherella- 'stoplight'- lime green leaves with burgundy red splotches pairs easily with other ornamentals like Kale 'Nagoya'- a purple splash that can add a dramatic contrast. (Heucherella is an evergreen and a cross between Heuchera and Tiarella.)

Adding some pumpkins and gourds in or around your planters will carry your fall décor right into the Thanksgiving season.

Keep this rule when choosing and planting - choose tall plants for the middle of the container. Next,

choose shorter/ medium sized plants to place around the tall plants. Lastly, choose vines or cascading plants that will overflow from your container.





## Area Residents Challenged to Kick Sugar For September

**DHHS AND CHAUTAUQUA COUNTY COMMUNITY TRANSFORMATION GRANT ENCOURAGE RESIDENTS TO REDUCE SUGAR IN THEIR DIETS**

The Chautauqua County Community Transformation Grant (CTG) is encouraging Chautauqua County residents to get themselves, co-workers, friends, and family into healthier habits by taking the Kick Sugar September Challenge.

The American Heart Association recommends adult women should get no more than 6 teaspoons or 25 grams of added sugar per day, adult men 9 teaspoons or 36 grams of sugar per day, and children 3 teaspoons or 12 grams of sugar per day. Most Americans consume in excess of 22 teaspoons of added sugar each day.

Considering that a popular brand of organic yogurt has 17 grams of sugar in just one serving, a can of cola has 10 teaspoons of sugar, and a 12 oz. bottle of cranberry cocktail juice has 12 teaspoons of sugar, it is easy to see how people can quickly exceed the recommended limit.

"I encourage all parents to discuss healthy eating choices with their children and set a goal of reducing sugar in their diets," said Chautauqua County Executive Vince Horrigan.

Sodas, sports drinks, energy drinks, and fruit drinks deliver very large amounts of sugar into the body very

quickly, and are the leading source of added sugar in the diet of many Americans. All that sugar can lead to weight gain, poor dental health, and eventually result in serious problems like diabetes and heart disease.

"Swapping out sugar-loaded drinks for water, unsweetened tea or coffee, seltzers, or low-fat milk is an easy way to reduce the extra sugar and calories in your diet," explains CTG Healthy Communities Coordinator Lisa Schmidtfrerick-Miller, and she notes, "drinking tap water is the healthiest, least expensive, and most environmentally-friendly beverage choice."

People who eliminate sugary drinks often drop a few pounds without ever feeling hungry. Kick Sugar Challenge participants can also elect to give up candy, baked goods, frozen desserts, yogurts, cereals, or other sweetened foods, or may simply try to stay within the American Heart Association recommendations for added sugar.

This challenge is brought to residents by the Community Transformation Grant and the Chautauqua County Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS). # Fredonia Climbs in U.S. News and World Report Rankings

## RANKS NINTH AMONG TOP REGIONAL PUBLIC UNIVERSITIES IN THE NORTH

U.S. News & World Report released its yearly "Best Colleges" rankings today, naming Fredonia as the ninth best "Top Public Regional University in the North" within its 2015 edition, up from 14th a year ago.

In the larger category of both public and private institutions in the North, Fredonia tied for 41st, up from 60th in 2014 among the "Best Regional Universities," which the publication

defines as 620 universities nationwide that offer primarily bachelor's and master's degrees. Only two other SUNY schools appear higher than Fredonia on this year's list.

Fredonia once again performed especially well in the category of first-year retention rates, with an impressive 81 percent of first-year students returning for their sophomore year. In addition, its first-year acceptance rate remained at a selective 52 percent, along with a graduation rate of 65 percent. Features such as small class sizes, favorable student-to-faculty ratios, high school grades and college entrance exam scores, assessment by administrators at peer institutions, and alumni giving are also factored into the process.

"My colleagues and I are pleased to be recognized once again by U.S. News & World Report as among the top universities in the North," said Fredonia President Virginia Horvath. "Fredonia faculty and staff focus on many of the measures used in their methodology, such as four-year graduation rates, student retention, small class sizes, and a low student-to-faculty ratio — which is an impressive 15:1 today.

"Those focus areas are important in

developing graduates who are skilled, creative, connected and responsible global citizens and professionals," Dr. Horvath added. "These commitments are much harder to measure in a rankings system, but Fredonia faculty and staff see them as equally vital in every student's education and development."

"Again this year, we are proud to see so many of our SUNY campuses recognized as being among the best nationally by U.S. News and World Report," said SUNY

Chancellor Nancy L. Zimpher. "In every community across New York State, SUNY colleges and

universities like Fredonia offer students top quality degree programs and applied learning opportunities that prepare them for success in today's 21st-century global economy. Congratulations to each of the SUNY campuses making the list for 2015!"

The annual rankings represent a comprehensive look at how schools stack up based on a set of widely accepted indicators of excellence. The rankings aim to help students evaluate and compare data compiled from nearly 1,365 ranked colleges and universities. The publication's "North" region includes nearly 200 four-year universities in Connecticut, Delaware, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island and Vermont. Fredonia has been ranked as a Best College every year since 1989.

The publication also recognizes the study's limitations: "The host of intangibles that make up the college experience can't be measured by a series of data points." However, the authors state, when combined with college visits, interviews, and student preferences, these rankings "can be a powerful tool in your quest for the right college."

I should begin by making one thing clear: I am a Buffalo Bills fan. I split season tickets with a group of friends. I watch every game, every year even when they're terrible (which has pretty much been every game, every year). As they say, I Billieve. While driving home from work that day I turned on sports radio to hear what others thought. I knew it'd be a fun conversation and I didn't want to miss out on all the excitement. Commencing their collaboration with the Center on July 21 were Melissa Lynn Becker, Warren Area High School; Caroline F. The Robert H. In her Fellowship project, "Jackson: Roots, Memory, and Legacy," Ms. Becker's 12th grade students will study Jackson's biography and create projects that will be used to teach 5th and 7th grade students about his life and achievements. In so doing, her hope is that Warren County will not only be known as the birthplace of Justice Jackson, but where the study of his life will be reborn each year. It is estimated that throughout the rest of her career, her practice will have a direct influence on the lives of approximately 3,000 students.

**Caroline Hayes** is a 6th grade Social Studies and English Language Arts educator at Youngsville Elementary Middle School in Warren County, PA. An active member of Delta Kappa Gamma, an international teaching sorority for key women educators, Ms. Hayes is passionate about service work and endeavors that focus on human rights issues. Promoting literacy and empowering her students to become exceptional writers is one of her paramount initiatives as a professional. Her Fellowship project for the Center will link the past to the present by having her students write, produce, perform and publish speeches affectionately nicknamed "Bob Talks" that will be shared with the global internet community to further Jackson's legacy and mission. In so doing, Ms. Hayes hopes to inspire students who grow up in the same region as Jackson did to follow in his footsteps and help change the world. It is estimated that she will directly influence over 2,000 students throughout the remainder of her career.

**Daiman Parinella** is a 7th and 8th grade social studies teacher at Washington Middle School in Jamestown. He has served as Student Council Advisor for several years, helping students form petitions, write and present speeches, and count ballots in a hands-on effort to teach students about the process of government and history. In addition, Mr. Parinella spends numerous hours working with fellow colleagues across the district to create lesson plans, units, and formative/summative assessments. For his Fellowship project, Mr. Parinella is creating a "Youth Leadership Summit," which is expected to launch at the Robert H. Jackson Center in February 2015. ## AAUW and JCC to Screen "The Invisible War"

The Jamestown Branch of the American Association of University Women (AAUW) and Jamestown Community College Political Science Department will screen the award winning documentary on sexual harassment in the military, "The Invisible War," on Thursday, September 18th at 7 pm on the Jamestown Community College Campus in the Student Union, John Hamilton Collegiate Center. James Kennedy, WNY Regional Director for Senator Kirsten Gillibrand, and Professor Gregg Rabb of JCC will introduce the film. The event is free and open to the public. The film premiered at the Sundance Film Festival in 2012, where it won the Audience Award, and has since received many other honors, including an Academy Award nomination for Best Documentary.

Sexual assault in the U.S. military is a significant problem, one that affects 20 percent of women and 1 percent of men in the armed forces. "The Invisible War," an investigative documentary, shows the impact that rape — and retaliation for reporting it — has had on thousands of service members. Elle Helmer, one of the women whose story is featured in the film, served as an officer in the U.S. Marines at the prestigious Marine Barracks in Washington, D.C., from 2005 to 2006. Helmer says she was raped in the company commander's office in 2006 but faced retaliation after reporting it and was told

not to seek medical aid. After she went to the hospital, her rape kit results were "misplaced." Helmer says her report was never taken seriously, and her alleged assailant was never charged.

"The Invisible War" also shows the efforts that are under way to address and prevent sexual violence in the military. One initiative is using the justice system to change the legal precedent that deems rape an "occupational hazard" of the job. Helmer is one of dozens of veterans involved in three lawsuits against the Department of Defense. She is a plaintiff in *Klay v. Panetta*. Several plaintiffs from one of the other lawsuits, *Cioca v. Rumsfeld*, are also featured in the documentary, as is the lawyer for all three cases, Susan Burke.

Through the AAUW Legal Advocacy Fund case support program, AAUW supports the veterans in these lawsuits as well as those in a third one, *Hoffman v. Panetta*. AAUW works to make all workplaces free from sex<sup>o</sup> discrimination and sexual violence. Viewers of the film hosted by AAUW on September 18th can help to fund LAF cases by buying popcorn and participating in a 50-50 drawing at the event. AAUW will also offer a reduced price membership of \$45.50 for a membership good through June 30, 2015. A member must have a two year degree or higher.

## Kabaddi

Take a deep breath. Deeper...fill your lungs. Now slowly let it out and say the word "Kabaddi" while you read the rest of this article.

When I was a kid, my friends and I invented games. All kinds of game, with all kinds of rules, using all kinds of resources. We threw, we caught, we kicked and chased and raced. We jumped, landed, tackled, wrestled, and hit things with sticks and bats and broom handles. We directed any object you could pick up and heave at any target you could point to, including throwing a football into a third story chimney to the dismay of my parents. We played freeze tag, and TV tag; dodge-ball and dodge-rock. We played home-run derby, kick-the-can, capture the flag, and hide and seek. We flew our bikes off ramps, tried to knock each other into oblivion in kill-the-carrier, and a played game called "Still" on a dock piece in the lake - a king-of-the-hill hybrid that brought splinters and possible drowning into the equation. Then, when we were bored or inspired enough, we'd take a few of these games and meld them into a single incomprehensible blend of contests, both competitive and cooperative; I'll stand on this side of the house and throw a ball of tape over the roof, you see if you can run and catch it on the other side. Okay, this time you try to tag me, but if I touch your flag before you do, you're poison and can't go inside for a week. You ride your bike up the side of that plywood ramp, and I'll try to knock you off with a baseball. If you survive the landing, you win. Those sort of games.

Are you still chanting "Kabaddi"? Good.

In India they play a game that blends tag, dodgeball, and wrestling. It is, in a word, ingenious. It's the national game of Nepal and Bangladesh, and the state game of the Indian states of Maharashtra, Tamil Nadu, Bihar, Andhra Pradesh, Telangana and Punjab. It's called Kabaddi, and if I was condemned to invent only one game in my

history of competitive design, this would be it. It has all the elements that we tried to build in our play as kids; skill, deception, team strategy, the potential for physical harm, and one random codicil that made no real sense in the context of the game itself but met or exceeded a certain level of challenge, and branded the game as ours. Okay, now ride over the ramp backwards with your eyes closed.

It's played on a tennis court sized field between two teams of seven players. One team sends a member (a "raider") across a mid-court line into enemy territory. That player tries to tag as many of the opponents as he can and return to his side of the court. Tag an opponent and you get a point, and the tagged player has to sit in a penalty box, and suffer the requisite humiliation of exclusion from play. You have to not only tag -using all your limbs, stepping on toes, flailing arms, swinging roundhouse kicks- but you have to make it back to your side unscathed, because the seven defenders are working hard to take you to the ground in a seven-on-one wrestling match called a "struggle". If they do, they score points, and, if at all possible, bruise your body and your ego. Thus commences a fascinating game of a single mouse battling a septet of cats. There are a bunch of rules for scoring, things you can and cannot do, etiquette and strategy as you might suspect to have developed in a sport dating to the 16th century that is now played in professional leagues in places I can't pronounce.

And here's the catch, the random element that cranks up the degree of difficulty and makes the game expressly unique; while the raider is in enemy territory he must hold his breath, and prove he's doing so by chanting the word "Kabaddi". No play or shot clock. No proscribed time limit. The entire game is based on how long you can hold your breath. How cool is that? How random? How ingenious? I wish I'd thought of it.

Okay... article is over, you can breathe again.

## Jamestown Jammers 2014 Season in Review

Opening night feels like it was just yesterday. The sun was shining, fans were lined up outside Russell E. Diethrick Park in great anticipation, the aroma of hot dogs and hamburgers filled the air, and the Jamestown Jammers were set to begin their 21st season in the Southern-Tier. Several months, and 75 games later, the 2014 season has officially come to a close. As I pointed out last week, there were plenty of ups and downs along the way, but there was an abundance of intense action, and high quality entertainment along the way as well. In the second year of affiliation with the Pittsburgh Pirates, many young draft picks, and several players on rehab assignment, made their mark on the 2014 season.

The Jammers heart and resilience was tested within the first several weeks of the season. After starting the 2014 campaign 3-8, the Jammers would reel off an impressive five game winning streak to even their record back up at .500. Jamestown's offense was led early on by catcher Taylor Gushue, the 4th round draft pick out of the University of Florida. Gushue hit five home runs in the Jammers first six games, including a two home run game against the Williamsport Crosscutters June 17th.

Heading into July, the Jammers sat at 8-9, and continued their see-saw season throughout the month. At the beginning of the month, the Jammers fell victim to a 10-game losing streak. However, the team's fight was again put on full display as they reeled off an impressive seven game winning streak to put their record at 15-18 as of July 18th. Outfielder Carl Anderson, the 19th round pick out of Bryant University in Rhode Island, really picked up his game in the month of July, and played a huge role in keeping the Jammers afloat. Anderson had five mutlti-hit games throughout the month, and went on to finish second on the team in hits in 2014, with 59. Anderson's efforts would be rewarded with an All-Star appearance in August at MCU Park, which is home of the Brooklyn Cyclones. On July 26th, catcher Kevin Krause, the 9th round pick out of SUNY Stony Brook, hit a walk-off home run in extra innings to defeat the Batavia Muckdogs, in what was arguably one of the Jammers best wins of the season.

July was also when Andrew Lambo made a brief appearance in Jamestown during a rehab stint. Lambo is now currently playing for the Pittsburgh Pirates, and is playing an important role for Pittsburgh down the stretch. On September 2nd against the St. Louis Cardinals, Lambo picked up two hits for the Pirates, while hitting second in the Pittsburgh lineup. Lambo's appearance in Jamestown might have been brief, but his big-league experience made a huge impact on a young Jammers team.

In August, players like Chase Simpson, Sam Street, Montana DuRapau, Jordan Luplow, Tyler Eppler, and Kevin Ross really began picking up momentum in their first professional seasons. Simpson, the 14th round pick out of Wichita State, went on a tear in August, and went on to lead all qualified Jammers in batting average, with a .286 clip, and in home runs, with seven.

Sam Street was stellar out of the Jammer bullpen all season long. In 16 appearances, Street had a stellar ERA of 0.98, and struck out 21 batters in 27 2/3 innings. Street was another Jammer who was selected to represent the Jammers in 2014 New York-Penn League All Star Game in Brooklyn.

DuRapau was given the Most Valuable Pitcher award for the Jammers in 2014, and had a 3-2 record on the season, with an impressive ERA of 2.21.

Luplow hit a walk-off home run in game one of the doubleheader the last day of the season (September 1st), and put an exclamation point on his fine first season. The third round pick out of Fresno State consistently hit at the top of the Jammer lineup, led the team in hits (61), and hit .277. He was given the Most Valuable Player award for the Jammers at the end of the year.

Eppler was another one of the Jammers best pitchers in 2014, and might have the best chance of making it to the big leagues. His tall frame, and electric stuff will play well in the Major Leagues if he continues to grow and develop.

Ross seamlessly made the adjustment from shortstop to first base at the beginning of the season, and was one of the most consistent Jammers all season long. In 44 games for the Jammers, Ross hit.
